I. VISION

Poverty eradication & sustainable human development through just and accountable enjoyment of natural and other resources for all and for the generations to come based on human rights principles.

II. PRINCIPLES

- Human Rights based & civil liberty
- Universality
- Social capital & Social Justice (across generation)
- Gender and Climate justice
- Equality, equity and Redistribution of income and wealth
- Intersectionality, Cultural diversity, non-discrimination & spirituality
- Promote Peace and Security and non-violence
- Mutual dependence of people and planet/ sustainability
 - Put environmental values into the economic system
- Transparency, accountability and inclusiveness
 - People's empowerment / democratic participation (marginalized and excluded must be at the center of development)
- Corporate social responsibility and environmental accountability
- National sovereignty & territorial integrity
- Ownership, Solidarity and partnerships

III. HOW TO SHAPE: The Framework

- Should capture inter-linkages such that development indicators do not stand alone
 - Needs to include planetary boundaries
 - Need to change production and consumption pattern in developed economies
 - Environment closely related to poverty as the poor and vulnerable to environmental calamities (floods, pollution, climate change)
 - Universality, equality, non-discrimination, intersectionality
 - localized solutions, input, implementation and outcomes
- Should be process-oriented, **promoting ownership at the national** levels and highlighting **partnerships especially at global level and south-south**
- Should be reflective of a bottom up process.
- Build on lessons learned from MDGs process
- Focused on specific outcomes
- One process – post MDG + SDG
- Policy coherence

- Enhancing development effectiveness
- Expand the **social responsibilities** of the private sector as part of public-private and social partnerships
- Need to include planetary boundaries
 - Recognition of nature as part of national infrastructure
- Environmental Sustainability should be translated into fair and equal use and enjoyment of natural resources
- Use local wisdom and knowledge for evidence based policy and practice change
- Interlinkages or development indicators do not stand alone
- Need to include planetary boundaries

- Governance system strongly support natural infrastructure and ecosystems services through regulation, taxes, and financial investment
- Human Centered Development to achieve Human Dignity, Human Right Enjoyment, Gender Equality (Happiness, well-being, Civil Liberties) & Poverty Eradication
- People's right to natural assets, livelihoods and biodiversity secured
- Enhance people capacity to adapt to climate change
